The removal of the organ from its "nook" in the main church has not left a void. Instead, it has created a new space. And with that, a wonderful opportunity for us to envision and create a sacred space that is in keeping with the overall beauty and design of the church.

Dan Barton of Maugel Architects was the architect who designed the extensive expansion

of St. Christopher's Church about a decade ago. We owe him a debt of gratitude for the functional and beautiful space that he designed. Not a day goes by when someone does not comment to me, "What a beautiful church." Dan is at it again: First, he has designed the choir loft surrounding the new Dobson organ; and, second, he has created an architectural drawing for the new space vacated by the old organ (see rendering on this page).

The considerable size of this space (it is not a glorified closet!), and its strategic location (it is a visual landmark which immediately grabs your attention upon entering the church) gives it great prominence and importance. Many thanks to Rob Bergh and LeeAnn McKenna for carefully disassembling the old organ and leaving the space spotless!

Two generous donors have enabled us to secure the architectural drawing and to begin the construction of its shell. All this at a time that coincides with the construction of the organ platform and the structural remediation of the ceiling (all under the excellent supervision of Peter Hughes).

However, the genre of artwork (paintings, icons, tapestries, etc.) and the theological themes rendered in them have not been



determined. Purpose, function, and the use of the space will, I believe, decide the form and content of the art rendered.

For example, this space can lend itself as a place of silence, solitude and stillness for individual prayer, meditation, and contemplation. Or simply as a place for those seeking some peace and quiet to center their busy lives. All that would take are some comfortable chairs! Or for the exceptionally daring Episcopaliansome kneelers!

Another example: While we perform the sacrament of baptism in front of the church at our principle Sunday liturgy, this space can provide a place for the font to rest during the week. As a result, baptismal themes of initiation and transformation, as well as a reminder of our baptismal covenant, etc., can be featured in the art presented.

Going Green

In the latest in a series of Earth-Honoring Faith (E-HF) efforts to cut our church's carbon footprint and operating costs, St. Christopher's is close to making a decision to install solar panels that promise to cut the church's annual electricity consumption, and electricity costs, by at least 65 percent—smart for our pocket and our planet.

The expected total cost of the

solar panel project is \$95,000, including reroofing. The good news is that we already have \$50,000 secured—including \$20,000 from a generous anonymous donor and \$30,000 allocated by the Finance Committee and Vestry. "The solar panel project really has the potential to take St Christopher's' environmental actions to the next level," said Brian McGurk, adding: "We can slash our energy bills and be kinder to our planet—all at the same time."

With the invaluable help of Ali Crockett and Peter Hughes, the E-HF Committee has recently undertaken a series of cost-cutting and pro-planet initiatives.


This past autumn, the E-HF Energy Team, of which Ali is a member, arranged for the Cape Light Compact (CLC) to replace all compact fluorescent bulbs with LEDs and, where necessary, install LED retrofit kits. The total cost of the project was \$11,500; St. Christopher's paid only \$2,300! Our estimated ongoing electric bill will be reduced by \$1,700, with an energy savings of 9,400 kilowatt hours annually.

The E-HF solar panel project promises to double-down on those energy and financial savings. We calculate solar energy will generate savings to our operating costs of approximately \$12,500 annually. The savings come from our substantial reduction in purchased energy and from the revenue provided to us

creatures—our pets.

Other possibilities remain unnamed at this present time. I look forward to your ideas. The next step is to consult with Sandra Bowden, curator of The Gallery at St. Christopher's, and the Art Committee for ideas and a plan.

by the Commonwealth of Massachusetts' sustainable solar incentive program. This means that the panel installation costs will be recovered in less than eight years. In energy terms, the approximately 36,500 kilowatt hours reduction in purchased electricity will reduce our church's annual CO2 emissions from electric use by over 65 percent.

What's more, the panels would not impact historic Main Street. The panels would be placed on the southeast roof of the Parish Hall, toward the eastern parking lot. Once the final proposal is selected, we will present the plan to the Historic Business District Commission.

Prior to the involvement of the E-HF Committee, the Church—under the direction of Ali and the Facilities Advisory Committee—had already completed many energy and dollar saving actions. These include: purchasing an Energy Star-certified refrigerator and freezer, adding reset controls for our energy-efficient gas boilers, insulating the attic and pipes carrying hot water and air-conditioning, sealing exterior doorways, and changing to programmable thermostats. As a result of these simple measures, St. Christopher's energy usage and operating costs have already dropped by almost 40 percent since 2016. With the additional savings from a solar installation—in electricity usage, operating costs, and CO2 emissions—the benefits will be felt for many years to come.

Meeting Needs; Offering Hope... this was the tag line of St. Vincent de Paul of Middletown, Conn., a social service agency that provides shelter, food, and counsel to those who are food and housing insecure. This agency served as an internship site for my students, and I was fortunate enough to be on their Board of Directors. One project that my students and I completed for St. Vincent's was

to compile a book of interviews from the guests at the soup kitchen entitled "Soup Stories." Through the telling and recording of the stories of our neighbors, we were reminded of the delight and richness of life and how much we share in common, in spite of our diverse backgrounds.

Meeting Needs; Offering Hope...with God's help and grace, this is the work of pastoral care at St. Christopher's. We have many participants in this work, including our Stephen Ministers, the members of our pastoral care steering committee, those who provide worship services at Liberty Commons and Woodlands, our Eucharistic Visitors, and myself as I lead the bereavement support drop-in group and provide other pastoral care. We all tend to the pastoral needs of our parishioners and community by providing encouragement, companionship, support, prayer, and so importantly, hope. We do this by actively listening to the stories with which we are honored enough to be trusted, by accepting another's vulnerability non-judgmentally, by offering promise of continued sharing

within the context of God's love.

In my role as Pastoral Associate, I am enriched by the rich, diverse, and poignant stories of those I counsel. However, I continue to rely on each of you to assist me in meeting the pastoral needs of the parish. Please contact me if you know of someone within or outside of our parish who may benefit from the following:

- **Bereavement Support.** Every Thursday, at 10:30 am, I offer bereavement support in my office for those experiencing the pain that accompanies loss. No appointment necessary.
- **Stephen Ministry.** Stephen Ministers are prepared to be supportive caregivers to parishioners who may be struggling through a transition or who might benefit from an ongoing caring relationship (Please note: if you are interested in becoming a Stephen Minister, please contact me).
- **Eucharistic Visitor.** Our trained Eucharistic Visitors are available to bring the Eucharist to those who are unable to get to church. (Please note: we will be offering a Eucharistic Visitor training soon; if you are interested in becoming a Eucharistic Visitor, please contact me).
- Pastoral home or hospital visit.
- · Pastoral support or counsel.
- Transportation. We are compiling a list of volunteers to transport parishioners to churchrelated activities. Please contact me if you know of someone who needs this or if you would like to volunteer.

A: The chasable is the outermost liturgical vestment that the priest wears while serving communion.

Where do the veil and burse go?

A: They dress the chalice. The burse is a flat square, fabric-covered case. The veil covers the chalice.

Who sets the table for communion?

A: One of three teams of the Altar Guild!

What is a Eucharist kit?

A: It is a small communion kit that a eucharistic visitor uses to take communion to parishioners who are unable to attend a service.
