The author, Anne Lamott, shares this story in her book, *Bird By Bird: Some Instructions On Writing and Life:* "Thirty years ago my older brother, who was ten years old at the time, was trying to get a report on birds written that he'd had three months to write. It was due the next day. We were out at our family cabin in Bolinas, and he was at the kitchen table close to tears, surrounded by

binder paper and pencils and unopened books on birds, immobilized by the hugeness of the task ahead. Then my father sat down beside him, put his arm around my brother's shoulder, and said, 'Bird by bird, buddy. Just take it bird by bird."

Like this procrastinating ten-year-old boy, I feel a bit overwhelmed, and at times, "...immobilized by the hugeness of the task ahead." Specifically, leading a congregation—safely and securely—through multiple crises (i.e. dangerous and unstable events): the COVID-19 crisis, the environmental crisis, the racial crisis, and the crisis of political partisanship and

polarization. All of these made worse by "pandemic fatigue." In and of themselves, each one of these challenges feels overwhelming. Together, they feel downright impossible!

Throughout his ministry,
Jesus confronted one crisis
after another, among them
sickness, suffering, hunger, poverty, selfishness, greed,
ignorance, hate violence and oppression. With

ignorance, hate, violence, and oppression. With compassion, self-sacrificial love, and the light of hope, he confronted each of these adversities "one bird at a time"—one person at a time, one challenge at a time, one step at a time. Let's follow Jesus' path during these challenging and taxing times and confront these

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present crises, "one bird at a time," with one prayer at time, one recorded or live-streamed service at a time, one Keeping Connected email at a time, one Vestry meeting at a time, one pastoral visit at a time, one Sunday School class at a time, one bereavement group session at a time, one stewardship campaign at a time, one budget at a time, one coffee hour at time, etc. As our bishop wrote, this is a "journey of stages" that will lead us into the "promised land" of regathering for inperson worship and community life.

We are not alone. As people of hope, we are empowered by God the Holy Spirit (who descended like a bird, a dove, upon Jesus at his baptism). The Holy Spirit will fill our churned-up hearts with compassion, love, courage, grace, peace and blessing. We travel into the unknown, together, and with hope.

Emily Dickenson wrote:

Hope is the thing with feathers
That perches in the soul,
And sings the tune without the words,
And never stops at all,

And sweetest in the gale is heard; And sore must be the storm That could abash the little bird That kept so many warm.

I've heard it in the chillest land, And on the strangest sea; Yet, never, in extremity, It asked a crumb of me.

This pandemic is "for the birds"!

Stewardship 2021: Keeping Connected

The 2021 stewardship campaign was launched on September 13 with a mailing to our parish community. The list included parishioners who, in one way or another, have made financial commitments to

our church either as pledgers or one-time donors. The mailing also included those people who have been following us over the internet. It was a broad list and the message stressed the importance of financial commitment to the church.

The Rector's theme this year is "Keeping Connected:

Today and Tomorrow." It flows from the difficult times in which we live today and how the church has blossomed in spite of our not being able to gather on Sunday mornings. And, perhaps most importantly, how we will regather in the future. We encourage you to read his stewardship message; it is truly compelling and uplifting.

These are difficult times. The virus has upended our normal lives, the presidential election has introduced an element of great uncertainty and anxiety, and to make

matters even more stressful, we have not been able to easily gather with our friends to share our thoughts and concerns. We find ourselves searching for those pillars of strength that will hold us upright, balanced, and of sound mind.

Our pillars—our family members, our few chances to gather with friends, and 625 Main Street in Chatham. You know—the building with the driftwood cross in the front yard. These are the pillars from which

we derive our strengths—the things that hold our own family together. And, we suspect your families as well.

It is probably no secret to you that the virus has caused no small amount of stress for our church finances. Because of some superb planning and actions by the people who serve on the various committees, we are in reasonably good shape for 2020. Next year is quite another matter, and we believe that we cannot let down our guard. Per the Rector's theme, we are healthy, thriving, and we intend not to waver.

It is for this reason that in this 2021 stewardship campaign we are asking you to take a very careful look at your financial commitment to the church that we love and make a concerted effort to increase your commitment in this campaign. Already the members of the Vestry, Finance and Stewardship committees have collectively increased their pledges by close



to 10 percent. As of October 27, we have received total pledges of \$421,766 from 117 pledgers, which amounts to 74% of the \$570,000 goal. Please help us maintain and grow that pillar of strength that is so very important in our lives—St. Christopher's. The stewardship committee (Mary Bast, Pam Hufnagel, Joe Meeks, Ginger Plexico, and Debby and Joe Saliba) extends its gratitude for your careful consideration of your 2021 pledge.

Initial responses suggest a sellout next year in even less than the three weeks this year. We let our first-responder organizations know we had thought of them, and will invite them again.

While we sorely regret the loss of our beloved golf treasurer of all ten years, Pieter Schiller, our enthusiastic Golf Committee co-chairs Joe Saliba and David Smith have agreed to lead our 2021 event. Joe and David welcome those interested in joining this committee, as our work is cut out to provide a high quality event and regain local business support through tee sponsorships.

This continues to be a financially challenging year due to the many implications of COVID-19. The shop is winding down, and there have been no in-person special events or regular liturgies since early March (except for St. Christopher's-in-the-Field in July). Despite these constraints, I'm pleased to report

that St. Christopher's is financially sound. Many of our members have stepped up to turn what could be considered lemons into lemonade!

The staff has done an excellent job managing our operating expenses. When we determined that the future of the Gift & Consignment Shop was untenable, Louise Montross and her team worked diligently to attract merchandise and generate sales to salvage what looked like a sizable loss into a win (see p. 3). Despite the fact that the golf tournament was cancelled, the golf committee managed to convert tournament fees into donations and sold many tee signs. As a result, the golf tournament will meet its budgeted contribution to church income (see above).

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Goll Farm School is Back in Session!

With much enthusiasm and excitement the students of Goll Farm School in Bong County, Liberia have begun a new school year. St. Christopher's Together With Africans (TWA) Committee continues to advocate for educational opportunities for the children of the Goll Farm Community. Through your generous support we have

provided 50 full scholarships for the fall semester.

As you can see in the picture, education in Liberia is not about modern classrooms and equipment. Rather it is about the opportunity that structured learning provides to make a real and significant difference in the

futures of these precious children.

Goll Farm School is an important ministry in the life of Liberian children as well as the spiritual life of the St. Christopher's family. In these challenging times it is easy to turn inward and want to keep everything close to home. However, we choose to go beyond our borders in a cost-effective way to positively influence the lives of students in the Goll Farm Community. It takes \$100 to educate a student for a semester, \$200 for a full year at Goll Farm School. A terrific return on investment!

A Report from the Treasurer, cont.

Our recently installed solar system is performing as designed. In July we generated 3.8 MWh and in August 4.2 MWh. Thus far we have reduced our electric bill by \$1,500. We also are certified for the state SMART program which will provide monthly payments to the church for the next ten years.

Pledge payments continue to track well and we thank everyone for their continued support. Pledges account for approximately 75 percent of our income and are extremely important to the financial stability of St. Christopher's.

The Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) loan we received in late April has supported cash flow and provided financial relief along the way. Once the PPP forgiveness rules and regulations are finalized by the SBA, we will apply for, and expect to receive, 100 percent loan forgiveness.

In these times when access to the church is limited and staff is working remotely I want to recognize the efforts of Bridgette Renaud in managing the accounts, supporting the annual financial review and maintaining financial order during these uncertain times.

Food Pantry Needed More Than Ever

a greater increase in the number of clients whom we service. On a weekly basis, we have doubled our volume of food that we distribute. New clients have signed up, as well as others who have returned for additional help once again.

After our initial twelve weeks of drive-through food distribution, we are now back at our spot right in the church. Our clients visit at the door, while volunteers remain inside behind a plexiglass shield. We are all safe, wearing our masks and gloves, while servicing our friends who remain outside, wearing their masks.

We must admit that one positive outcome, during this time of COVID-19, has been the chance to get

Finally, as we anticipate the arrival of the new pipe organ in 2021, we look forward to a summer 2021 exhibition celebrating music in art. More on that to come!


Pipe Organ Update

Progress continues toward the planned March 2021 installation of the new Dobson pipe organ. Work was completed in the spring of 2020 to create a choir loft, including an accessibility lift. Many thanks to Peter Hughes for executing that phase. Meanwhile, work commenced at the Dobson shop in Lake City, Iowa, on the construction of the organ itself. While the organ is currently scheduled to be installed in March of 2021, this is a process that takes a few months before the organ can actually be used. Finally, up until his very last days, Pieter Schiller was working tirelessly on details

related to the project. While we press forward toward the goal, we remember his work with gratitude, knowing that we would not be seeing this project come to fruition without his years of dedicated leadership and sacrifice.



Hymn Contest Winner Announced

In preparation for the dedication of the new pipe organ, a task force was created in 2019 to oversee the dedicatory Choral Evensong, opening reception, dedicatory solo organ recitals, and inaugural collaborative recitals with organ and community musical ensembles. The task force is comprised of Sarah Anderson,

Jeff Arnold, Maury A. Castro, Peggy Davis, Jennifer Golini, Lee Tashjian, and Haskell Thomson. In order to commemorate the dedicatory Choral Evensong, the task force initiated a hymn contest for the creation of a new hymn text (the hymn tune will be chosen by St. Christopher's, and will be a tune familiar to the parish). The hymn text was to celebrate, to the Glory of God, the mission and ministry of St. Christopher's Church, in its sea-side context (as opposed to celebrating the new instrument). The contest announcement reached a worldwide audience, and 29 submissions were received by the May 1, 2020 deadline. Lee Tashjian, head of this project, coalesced the submissions, delivered them to the jury (comprised of Maury A. Castro, The Rev. Dr. Carl Daw, Jr., Anne LeClaire, The Rev. Dr. John Martiner, The Rev. Brian W. McGurk, and Haskell Thomson). After careful consideration, a winning entry was identified: Wind, Who Whispered Into Being by Dr. Lydia Pedersen.

Dr. Pedersen, of Toronto, Ontario, Canada, says of her winning the hymn competition, "I am deeply honoured by this decision, knowing how many excellent hymn writers there are in America and Canada. It is the first time I have won such a competition. What engaged me from the start was a confluence of things I hold dear: Cape Cod, the location of many happy memories; the purpose, inaugurating a new organ; and the stated wish for a text that lifts up music in the context of Pentecost, one of my favourite church festivals. I feel grateful and very privileged to think that my words will help St. Christopher's congregation celebrate this memorable, festive occasion, and I extend my most heartfelt congratulations to you in your rejoicing. May your new instrument bring you many years of delight, comfort, faith, hope and joy through the unique blessings of music."
